SECTION 4: First-aid measures

4.1 Description of necessary first-aid measures

If inhaled

Fresh air, rest. Refer for medical attention.

Following skin contact

Remove contaminated clothes. Rinse and then wash skin with water and soap. Refer for medical attention .

Following eye contact

First rinse with plenty of water for several minutes (remove contact lenses if easily possible), then refer for medical attention.

Following ingestion

Rinse mouth. Do NOT induce vomiting. Refer for medical attention .

4.2 Most important symptoms/effects, acute and delayed

Inhalation of high concentrations of vapor may result in narcosis; peripheral neuropathy may develop. Ingestion of large amounts may cause some systemic injury. Contact with eyes causes mild to moderate irritation. Liquid irritates skin; prolonged or repeated contact may cause defatting of the skin with resultant dermatitis. (USCG, 1999)

4.3 Indication of immediate medical attention and special treatment needed, if necessary

An accurate history is essential to determine whether a person has been exposed to /2-hexanone/. ...Patient may report weakness, muscle cramps, numbness, and paresthesias such as the feeling of tingling, burning, and freezing. Impotence may occur. The physical examination should examine all muscle groups for weakness. Peripheral muscles are affected first, with more proximal weakness after more prolonged exposure. Muscle stretch reflexes are absent distally in areas of weakness. Atrophy of the hand muscles has been reported. Hyperhidrosis may occur. All sensory modalities may be affected, including touch and proprioception. Patients should be assessed for cerebellar signs and tremor. Visual acuity and peripheral vision changes have not been reported, whereas blurred vision has. Tinnitus may occur. Signs of parkinsonism should be sought. ...The patient must be removed from all future exposure. Physical therapy should be initiated to maintain full range of motion until reinnervation occurs. Recovery is slow, as the regeneration of axon fibers must take place. Complete recovery of strength may not occur.

SECTION 5: Fire-fighting measures

5.1 Suitable extinguishing media

If material is on fire or involved in fire: Do not extinguish fire unless flow can be stopped. Use water in flooding quantities as fog. Solid streams of water may spread fire. Cool all affected containers with flooding quantities of water. Apply water from as far a distance as possible. Use "alcohol" foam, dry chemical or carbon dioxide.

Absorb bulk liquid with fly ash, cement powder, or commercial sorbents.

7.1 Precautions for safe handling

NO open flames, NO sparks and NO smoking. Above 23°C use a closed system, ventilation and explosion-proof electrical equipment. Handling in a well ventilated place. Wear suitable protective clothing. Avoid contact with skin and eyes. Avoid formation of dust and aerosols. Use non-sparking tools. Prevent fire caused by electrostatic discharge steam.

SECTION 12: Ecological information

12.1 Toxicity

- Toxicity to fish: LC50 Pimephales promelas (Fathead minnow, 31 days old) 428 mg/L/96 hr at 25 deg C (99+% purity), flow-through bioassay.
- Toxicity to daphnia and other aquatic invertebrates: no data available
- Toxicity to algae: no data available
- Toxicity to microorganisms: no data available

12.2 Persistence and degradability

AEROBIC: Biodegradation is expected to be an important fate process for this compound(1). Using an acclimated mixed microbial culture seed, a 59% theoretical biological oxygen demand for 2-hexanone was obtained after five days(2). In a five day test using an activated microbial culture, 2-hexanone consumed 61.4% of its theoretical oxygen demand(4).

12.3 Bioaccumulative potential

An estimated BCF of 2 was calculated for 2-hexanone(SRC), using a log Kow of 1.38(1) and a regression-derived equation(2). According to a classification scheme(3), this BCF suggests the potential for bioconcentration in aquatic organisms is low(SRC).

12.4 Mobility in soil

The Koc of 2-hexanone is estimated as 134(SRC), using a log Kow of 1.38(1) and a regression-derived equation(2). According to a classification scheme(3), this estimated Koc value suggests that 2-hexanone is expected to have high mobility in soil.

13.1 Disposal methods

Product

The material can be disposed of by removal to a licensed chemical destruction plant or by controlled incineration with flue gas scrubbing. Do not contaminate water, foodstuffs, feed or seed by storage or disposal. Do not discharge to sewer systems.

Contaminated packaging

Containers can be triply rinsed (or equivalent) and offered for recycling or reconditioning. Alternatively, the packaging can be punctured to make it unusable for other purposes and then be disposed of in a sanitary landfill. Controlled incineration with flue gas scrubbing is possible for combustible packaging materials.
